

Dear Evans Residents,

Weld County is known as the lowest property tax county in the state of Colorado and the City of Evans has by far the lowest City property tax in Weld County. Throughout this year, the Evans City Council has taken a close and deliberate look at the City's property tax structure in light of rising costs and increasing demands on our infrastructure and services. As part of this evaluation, we actively sought input from you -our community- through a public opinion poll conducted by Magellan Strategies, along with a series of town hall meetings.

The message we heard from our residents was clear and consistent: Do not raise my property taxes but vigorously improve street maintenance and improvements. I want to sincerely thank everyone, including former elected officials in Evans, who took the time to share their thoughts and advocate for what matters most. Your feedback has played a critical role in guiding our next steps.

The City Council remains firmly committed to making Evans the Community of Choice in Northern Colorado. Over the past few years, we've made substantial investments to modernize our infrastructure - from upgrading stormwater and sanitary sewer infrastructure to replacing heavy equipment in support public safety and year-round maintenance. We've built new neighborhood parks and revitalized existing playgrounds. We've also seen exciting new developments take shape - such as Liberty Draw and Evans Junction - which bring new opportunities and economic vitality to our city.

Equally important has been our focus on improving streets. From commutes to commerce, safe and well-maintained streets affect every Evans resident, every single day. In 2020, Evans voters approved a 1% street sales tax to fund roadway improvements. This funding has already allowed for significant projects, such as improvements to 23rd Avenue and 37th Street.

In 2025, Council made a strategic decision to broaden the reach and impact of these efforts. This year alone, we completed full overlays of 17th and 23rd Avenues between 32nd and 37th Streets, including the replacement of deteriorated concrete curbs and gutters - enhancing both

functionality and appearance - and soft spots in the road base to prevent potholing. Next, we'll launch a full reconstruction of 42nd Street between 23rd and 35th Avenues - ensuring not just a smoother drive, but a stronger foundation beneath it.

We also recognize the urgent needs that arise unpredictably. This spring's heavy rains significantly damaged 49th Street, resulting in nearly \$250,000 in emergency repairs just to restore access. It's a stark reminder of just how vulnerable our roads are - and underscores the importance of sustained investment in our surface transportation network.

The 1% road tax is critical to the City's investments in roads and infrastructure. After thoughtful consideration and strong community feedback, the Evans City Council has made the decision to forgo a ballot initiative that would increase property taxes and focus our efforts on continuing the existing 1% street sales tax to improve and maintain roads WITHOUT raising taxes. This decision reflects not just financial prudence, but the values and preferences of the community we serve.

Continuing the street sales tax provides a fair, effective, and widely supported path forward. Unlike a property tax increase, the street sales tax distributes the cost of street maintenance among all who use our streets - including visitors and shoppers - rather than placing the full burden solely on local property taxpayers.

Difficult policy conversations are part of responsible governance. The past several months have shown us the power of civic dialogue - where community input meets Council leadership to shape thoughtful solutions.



City Council Update - June 2025

In June, the Evans City Council received the first of two briefings on the results of a market survey pertaining to the on-going Recreation Needs Assessment. A sample of just under 400 Evans residents were polled via text message by the firm PROS consulting, which specializes in helping municipalities develop long-range plans for parks and recreation. This was an important first step as the City works to develop an overall Parks and Recreation Master Plan.

We encourage residents to sign-up for free Recreation Alerts provided via email on the City website and closely follow City of Evans recreation on social media for updates on available programming. Furthermore, pages 20-23 in this newsletter highlight upcoming sports league information.

The City Council also approved the purchase of wheeled excavator and associated trailer for the City's Water Division. This new piece of equipment, purchased from Wagner Equipment Co. for \$340,000 from the City's Water Fund (revenue for the water fund is generated through utility payments and water system development fees from new developments) was critically needed and long overdue. The new excavator will allow the City's Public Works Department to complete deferred maintenance associated with the Evans Ditch as well as culvert and water line repairs.

At the June 3 meeting, the Council voted unanimously to approve the purchase of brand new playground equipment for Renaissance Park. The City contracted GameTime Altitude, who has done work with the City in the past, most recently designing and installing the new playground at Ridge Park, for the new playground. A total of \$500,000 allocated from was Conservation Trust Fund, which is disbursed by the state municipalities for parks, recreation and conservation needs using revenue generated by the Colorado Lottery. Work on installing this new playground is slated to begin soon.




The new Renaissance Park playground structure as designed by GameTime Altitude and approved by the Evans City Council

City of Evans Projects Update

Considering the climate we have here in Colorado, there are only a few months of the year that major infrastructure projects can be undertaken. With that in mind, work is underway all over the City. Major upgrades have been completed on 17th and 23rd Avenues, work on Phase 2B of the 37th Street widening project is progressing on schedule and work will begin this month on a full reconstruction of 42nd Avenue/Prairie View Drive.



More than just roadways are receiving attention summer. Work recently began on Hunter's Reserve Park, providing a community park with a playground and nature play area in what was before a vacant field.

The Evans Junction site, located at 31st St./HWY 85, has wrapped infrastructure work and McDonalds has broken ground. There are three other lots on this piece of prime commercial real estate, so expect more businesses open in Evans.



The road projects highlighted here are made possible by the 1% Road Ahead sales tax. This revenue stream is critical to maintaining our roadways and ensures that everyone who stops and shops in Evans, using our City's streets, helps contribute to their upkeep. With continuance of this tax, more and more roadways in the City will be upgraded and expanded in future years.
















Business Spotlight - Sam's Club

For some businesses, the community in which they exist means little more than how it can contribute to their bottom line: these businesses exist in a community without becoming a part of it. Other businesses put forth extra effort to entrench themselves into the community, its people and it's culture. Sam's Club in Evans is one such business.

Yes, shoppers know that they can count on the low prices, convenience, and the wide variety of products that are available at all Sam's Club locations.

But in Evans – things are done differently – and in a very good way. Mickey Hendren, general manager in Evans since 2018, has made it a point to create and strengthen bonds with the local community. "We try to know our members – we try to make them feel like we're not just a huge box store," says Hendren.





Part of the culture that Hendren has built is empowering his managers and employees to make decisions for the betterment of the store and its customers. According to Hendren, "every person here – from maintenance to floor managers – is empowered to pull an item off the floor if it doesn't meet the standards we have set. If you wouldn't want that item in your home, pull it."

This has created an environment where customers want to shop, and where employees want to work.

But there's more to this story.

Teresa McClatchey (who served as a City of Evans police officer and school resource officer for 18 years), has played a vital role in connecting Sam's Club directly to needs within our community. It all began when Hendren noticed McClatchey loading winter coats into a shopping cart at the club. Curious, he asked her what she was doing. She mentioned the need for winter apparel by children in our community. Touched, Hendren offered to match her donation in kind. (continued on page 7)

(**from page 6**) What developed from there is an impressive connection between need and supply in Evans. As Hendren put it, "Teresa hand-built the supply chain for donated product distribution." McClatchey, because of many years of getting to know residents, schools, nonprofits, and businesses, has a unique knowledge of specifically where need exists in our community. With the cooperation of Sam's Club, McClatchey can quickly deploy volunteers (from both the city as well as employees of Sam's Club) to deliver goods exactly where they are needed.

McClatchey joins Hendren in recognizing the value of the partnership that has formed between Sam's Club and the City of Evans: "Mickey exemplifies the qualities of a great leader. His generosity is truly inspiring, and he stands as an outstanding role model for his team. Our community deeply appreciates his contributions."

The community-serving projects in which Sam's Club has been involved are many. Sam's Club has "adopted" the residents of Centennial Village and provides donations of needed food supplies to help meet the needs of our senior population. Sam's Club also organizes an annual Christmas gift event for Centennial Village, which provides a wrapped gift for each senior resident, based on their wish lists.

In addition to these projects, Sam's Club regularly donates product to Habitat for Humanity community members, low-income trailer communities, shelters and the Immigrant and Refugee Center.

By shopping local at the Evans Sam's Club, our citizens can help support these ongoing efforts between the store and our city. When community bonds run deep, all parties benefit. The City of Evans is proud to have a strong community partner in Sam's Club.

Through FREE environmental site assessments (ESAs) and customized planning support, the Evans Property Initiative empowers commercial and industrial property owners to turn underutilized sites into thriving community assets.



WHAT WILL WE BE DOING?

The Citizens Police Academy promotes community partnerships and is designed to familiarize individuals with the day-to-day operations of the police department. Students will participate in field trips to the jail and dispatch center, attend lectures covering law enforcement topics such as taser deployment, drone technology, SWAT strategies, and coroner procedures, and engage in practical training through an impaired driving course, traffic stop simulations, and crime scene investigation exercises.

The program is free of charge. Seating is limited to 25 participants and you must be at least 18 years of age to participate. A background check will be completed on applicants prior to acceptance. Applications can be obtained at the Evans Police Department front desk during regular business hours, Monday through Friday between 8:00 am and 5:00 pm.



Thefts From Vehicles Increasing



The Evans Police Department has seen a noticeable uptick in thefts from parked cars recently. In the some of the cases, the vehicles were locked, and the thieves broke into the car to remove personal items. In the majority of cases, however, the vehicles were left unlocked.

allowing the thieves to simply help themselves to whatever items of value they could find in the vehicles. The most frequent types of personal items stolen include wallets, purses, car stereos, driver's licenses, insurance and registration documents, laptop

the theft of personal items difficult for the victim, but many of these stolen items can be used in the commission of other, often times more serious, crimes including credit card fraud and identity theft, to name a few. Criminal vehicle trespass, more commonly called car break-ins, usually occur in clusters within neighborhoods.

Thieves will target a specific neighborhood one night and the next night or a few nights later, move on and hit other neighborhoods. The result is that cars parked anywhere throughout the City can become targets for theft. While this type of crime is disturbing and the Evans PD is doing all they car to prevent thefts, the good news is there

are a lot of easy, common sense actions residents and their visitors can take to reduce the chances of becoming a victim.





The Evans Police Department is encouraging residents to:

- · Lock your car doors and seal your windows. As simple as it sounds, you would be surprised how many thefts occur from vehicles left unlocked or with the windows open overnight.
- Use all the safety features with which your vehicle is equipped. Make sure to activate your alarm and investigate quickly if you hear your car alarm go off while you are away from it.
- · Do not leave anything of value in your car. Leaving your purse or wallet, cell phone or laptop, your golf clubs or gym bag in plain view makes it an easy target for thieves. Even a zipped-up gym bag or backpack can be tempting for a thief as they cannot be sure if the bag contains dirty exercise clothes or something far more valuable like your bankbook, membership cards, small entertainment devices or expensive tools.
- · Park in a well-lit, secure area visible to others. Thieves prefer to break into vehicles parked in dark and secluded areas and avoid welllet areas as much as possible.
- · Form a neighborhood watch group. Banding together with your neighbors helps provide cover for when you, or your neighbors, are away. See page 6 for more.
- · Report the Crime. If you do find yourself a victim, report the crime immediately to the Evans PD.









Neighborhood Watch



Neighborhood Watch is a program where community members, in cooperation with the Evans Police Department, participate in the detection and deterrence of crime in their neighborhoods.

The Neighborhood Watch Program facilitates communication between you and your neighbors.

Additionally, it develops a partnership between our City police force and citizens to help enhance the safety and security of our neighborhoods.

Summer Lawn Watering Tips

The numbers above are based on watering 3 times per week. With all sprinkler types cycle and soak can help increase efficiency and reduce runoff. Run 2-3 cycles 45-60 minutes apart. The total run time for the day should equal the number recommended in the table above.

The City of Evans has Outdoor Watering Policies effective between April 15 and October 15.

Outdoor watering is allowed on scheduled days except between the hours of noon and 5pm.

- Single-family homes with even-numbered addresses shall only water lawns on Sunday, Tuesday, and Thursday of each week.
- Single-family homes with odd-numbered addresses shall only water lawns on Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday of each week.
- Multi-family residents or apartments shall only water lawns on Sunday, Tuesday, and Friday of each week. Watering mid-day leads to loss of water through evaporation from the sun.

^{*}Please note that these are recommended run times for our region, if your lawn is suffering at these recommended run times please adjust time and cycles accordingly. Alternatively, if you water less than this and your lawn is healthy, do not water more than needed.



Outdoor Street Lighting How to report a Street Light Outage



What you will need to report a street light outage

The Pole number where the light is located—the pole number will be on the street side of the pole and will either have two numbers over two, or three over three.

For Example



Xcel Energy relies on the information you provide so please be as specific as possible. If the pole does not have a number, then please provide the address behind the pole, or a description of where the pole is located.

For example: The light is located on the Southwest corner of E. 16th Ave and Pennsylvania.

FIRST: Select the Outages icon at the top of the page as indicated below



NEXT: Scroll to the bottom of the page and look for Outdoor lighting Outages and click on REPORT AN OUTDOOR OUTAGE as seen below



Finally: Enter your information.

- 1. Your name
- 2. Your email address: This is used to inform you when the light is repaired.
- 3. Contact phone number: This will be used to contact you should we have any questions regarding your repair request.

Pole information: ****If an outdoor lighting pole is broken, please call Xcel Energy Customer Care at 1-800-895-4999.

- 1. Select the problem with the light
- 2. Pole number: This is where you would enter the two over two or three over three numbers on the pole.
- 3. Light location: This is the Address where the light is located. Please provide as much specific information as you can.
- 4. Comments: Provide any additional information that you believe would be helpful

Lastly: You may Add more outages if there are more than one or hit the submit button.

Once you submit the request you will be provided a confirmation number. Keep this number to refer back to if needed.

***Please note: Repairs are made in 5 business days unless there is more than routine maintenance is required.
