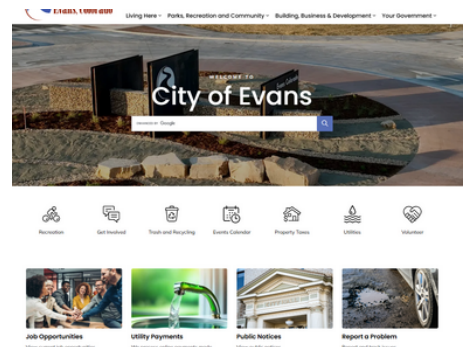


Evans PD Celebrates Five Graduates from Police Academy

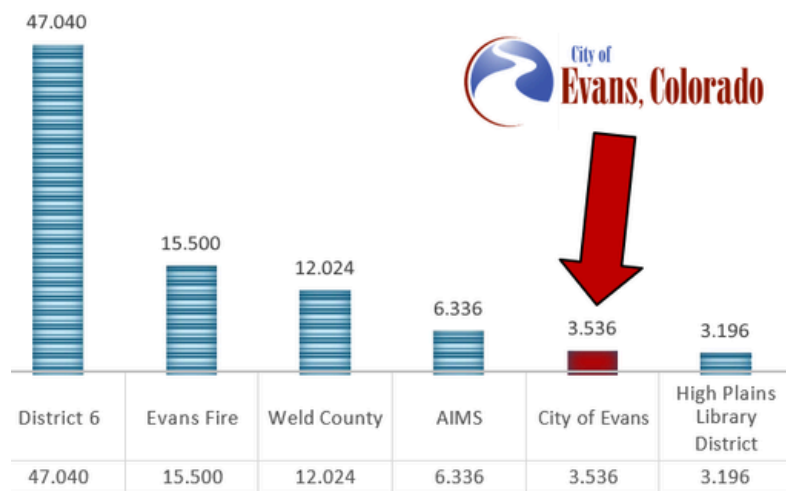
City Council Update – December 2024

As 2024 came to a close, the Evans City Council used their regularly scheduled meetings, held on Dec. 3 and Dec. 17, to handle some routine housekeeping measures such as setting the schedule for 2025 meetings, approving the final budget adjustments for the year, authorizing temporary right of way access for several fiberoptic installations that will cross the Evans Ditch, and gave the green light for the Municipal Court to purchase upgraded computer software that will replace the outdated applications the court has been using for quite some time.

Evans takes in lower than expected property tax revenue.

The Evans City Council approved a routine measure on Dec. 3 to certify the City's property tax levy for 2024 to the Weld County Assessor and the State of Colorado. The City's Finance Director reported to the Council that the City received only \$883,654 in property tax revenue for the year, below the projected \$938,762. As outlined in detail in the September issue of this newsletter, the City of Evans receives less than 4% of residents' annual property tax payments, far less than District 6, the Evans Fire District, Weld County and others. The City also has a much lower mill rate than many neighboring communities at just 3.536.

Evans Junction Work Begins

The major priority for the Council is economic growth and development. Earlier in the year, the Council approved the sale of one lot of land at the four-lot Evans Junction property (southwest corner of U.S. 85 and 31st St.) for the construction of a McDonald's restaurant. Installing the needed infrastructure at the site is required before work on any of the lots can begin and the Council approved a contract for NPL Construction to install Atmos Energy natural gas lines, allowing progress to move full steam ahead.

Council approves design work for new Police Station

Another milestone was reached last month in the plans to bring a state-of-the-art police station to the City as the Council enthusiastically approved a contract with D2C Architects for design and engineering services for the new police station.



The Evans City Council renewed the intergovernmental agreement with Greeley to continue the Greeley Evans Transportation (GET) program. To learn more about GET, scan the QR Code above.



Business Spotlight - Roma Restaurant

On any given day, because of the open-concept kitchen/dining area, you can watch Roma employees toss pizza crust, build carolis, assemble lasagna or roll balls of dough. Ball estimates that in the 21 years he's worked for Roma, he has rolled over one million dough balls.



A family business that is family friendly

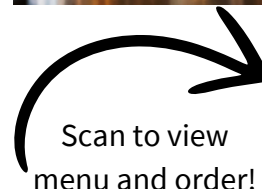
In fact, Ball met his wife, Becky, at Roma back in 2004. The couple now have two sons: Jacob (15) and Matthew (10). One day, Jacob was working at Roma when he was on a break from school. After watching his dad laugh and interact jovially with customers and employees, Jacob said "Geez dad - I wish you were this nice at home!" Younger son Matthew also chips in by helping mix dough and roll it into balls.

Ball believes that it's the people - both employees and customers - who make Roma a special place. He talks fondly about the friends he's made with customers and employees, and how every day at work is a different experience: "It's family-owned, and it's a family within the staff. If you're around family and they've got your back, it's not work - it's fun."

When asked what people can expect to experience at Roma, Ball answered: "A family environment with great food at great prices." Roma currently has sixty employees across its three locations.

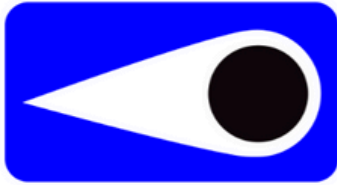

Here are some tips for staying safe this holiday season



Last year, more than 120 million packages were stolen across the U.S., according to data from SafeWise, a safety and security research firm. The most common time of year for package theft is during the holidays. With more and more of us shopping online these days, thieves have almost countless options for the chance to swipe a package right off of your front porch. These porch pirates are crafty – they will often scope out neighborhoods in advance, wait and watch for the delivery trucks to arrive, drop off the packages and depart, and then, BOOM!, they pounce, stealing everything from your prescription medication to your children's or grandchildren's Christmas presents. We know that delivery drivers do their best, trying to put packages out of view and taking photos to email you once your package has arrived, but you can take additional steps to help prevent being a target.

INSTALL A VIDEO CAMERA

CHOOSE ALTERNATE DELIVERY

IF POSSIBLE, YOU CAN HAVE YOUR PACKAGES DELIVERED TO A TRUSTED FRIEND OR FAMILY MEMBER WHO YOU KNOW WILL BE HOME TO ACCEPT YOUR PACKAGE AND HOLD IT FOR SAFE KEEPING UNTIL YOU CAN PICK IT UP. ALSO, MANY DELIVERY COMPANIES AND ONLINE RETAILERS ALLOW YOU HAVE YOUR PACKAGE DELIVERED TO A SECURE LOCKBOX WHERE YOU CAN COLLECT IT AT YOUR CONVENIENCE.

GET A PORCH PIRATE BAG

Cold Weather Tips

“Puffing” is illegal in Colorado Take care of your 4-legged friends



With cold temperatures here, the Evans Police Department is reminding residents to make their vehicles a hard target for theft.

During winter months, car thieves often target “puffers,” or vehicles left running and unattended as they warm up. This nickname stems from the puff of the exhaust visible during cold weather. Thieves often search for puffers because they are easy targets and then use these stolen cars to commit other crimes.

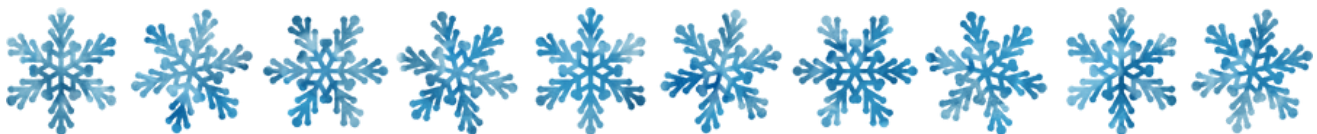
In Colorado, puffing is Class B traffic infraction. This means that in addition to being the victim of a theft, a vehicle owner can be fined for leaving their car running while unattended. The only exception to this law relates to vehicles with a remote ignition system.

The Evans Police Department is asking residents to either (1) stay with their vehicle when it's warming up or (2) use a remote start, lock the doors, and take the key with them.

According to the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA), temperatures below just 45 degrees can cause health problems for some pets.

The AVMA states, “It's a common belief that dogs and cats are more resistant than people to cold weather because of their fur, but it's untrue. Like people, cats and dogs are susceptible to frostbite and hypothermia and generally should be kept inside. Longer-haired and thick-coated dog breeds, such as huskies and other dogs bred for colder climates, are more tolerant of cold weather; but no pet should be left outside for long periods in below-freezing weather.”

Other cold weather pet protection tips from the AVMA include wiping off your dogs paws, as well as their chest and belly for short-legged dogs, after walks as they could pick up dangerous de-icing chemicals from the ground. Make sure your dog has a collar and is micro-chipped as if they wander away, cold and snow can limit their sense of smell and thus their ability to potentially find their way back home if lost.

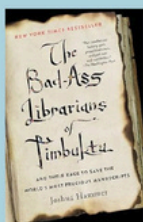

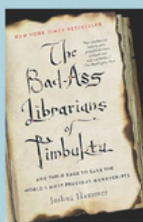

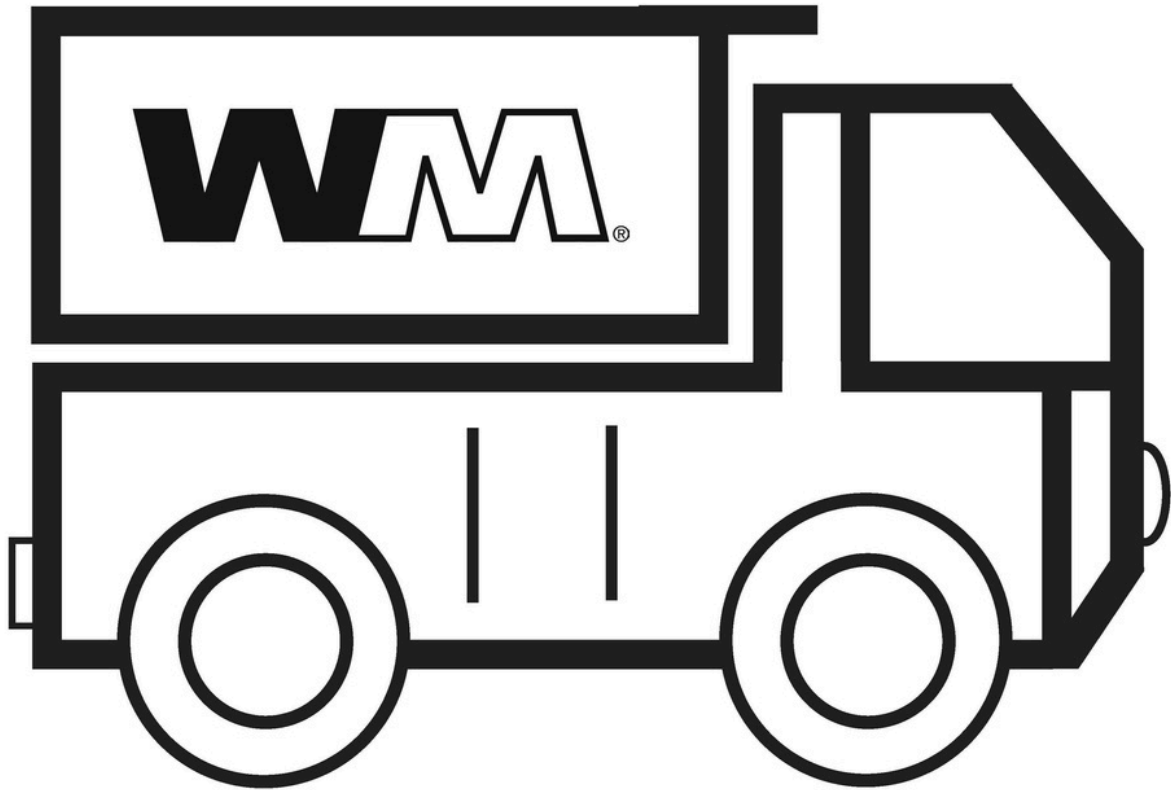

How to report a Street Light Outage



What you will need to report a street light outage

The Pole number where the light is located—the pole number will be on the street side of the pole and will either have two numbers over two, or three over three.

For Example



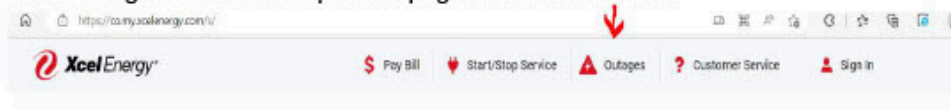
Xcel Energy relies on the information you provide so please be as specific as possible. If the pole does not have a number, then please provide the address behind the pole, or a description of where the pole is located.

For example: The light is located on the Southwest corner of E. 16th Ave and Pennsylvania.

Where to report a Street light Outage?

FIRST: Select the Outages icon at the top of the page as indicated below



NEXT: Scroll to the bottom of the page and look for **Outdoor lighting Outages** and click on **REPORT AN OUTDOOR OUTAGE** as seen below



Next: Click on **Report it now** →

Finally: Enter your information.

1. Your name
2. Your email address: This is used to inform you when the light is repaired.
3. Contact phone number: This will be used to contact you should we have any questions regarding your repair request.

Pole information: ****If an outdoor lighting pole is broken, please call Xcel Energy Customer Care at 1-800-895-4999.

1. Select the problem with the light
2. Pole number: This is where you would enter the two over two or three over three numbers on the pole.
3. Light location: This is the Address where the light is located. Please provide as much specific information as you can.
4. Comments: Provide any additional information that you believe would be helpful

Lastly: You may Add more outages if there are more than one or hit the submit button.
