Historical landmark Esch's Market torn down to create room for new development at Highway 85 and 31st Street



Heritage Days expanded to a two-day festival for the first time since 2009. The annual celebration included fireworks and hot-air balloons for the first time in the festival's history.

Evans TV Debuts in 2020

The City will launch its own TV series on Youtube beginning in January of 2020.

Evans Communications Manager Lance Snow knew Evans had an involved community with an appetite for engagement. That's when the idea hit him: Evans needs its own TV channel to promote, educate, inform, and entertain its residents.

"We didn't have a choice. This idea has been simmering in the crock-pot for more than a year. It was going to happen," Snow said with a chuckle. "We have a city that's filled with great stories and we have a lot of growth occurring in in our City. It's the perfect time to advance our connection with the people that shape our community."

Snow, a former TV Executive Producer and Anchor at various local news affiliates prior to accepting a role in City Government, has the experience and knowledge to make Evans TV a success.

"We've assembled a dynamic cast of talent that we believe is going to resonate with our residents."

The show will air on YouTube once a week beginning in January of 2020. It will feature a rotating panel of hosts. The program will also feature a spin-off that is spoken in Spanish and hosted by a revolving panel of hosts.



"The Latinx Community makes up roughly 50% of the population in Evans, so it's crucial that we connect with everyone in our city's population."

Prior to the launch, the city will explore ways to involve its residents. The show will also include street reports and a Business Blast segment that is derived from the Evans Economics Department's "Business Blast" Newsletter.

"There's a ton of valuable business information for current and potential business owners," Evans Economic Development Manager Allison Moeding, said. "We're thrilled that we can utilize the power of YouTube to expand our economic footprint and connect with our residents."

In addition to Government-related content, the Evans Recreation Department will be able to showcase the various programs that are available for kids, adults, and seniors.

"Sports is great for our City and we love the exposure of our own TV outlet" Evans Receptions Director Brian Stone, said. "It will give our kids and programs recognition throughout the region."

Evans TV isn't the first video enhancement the City has promoted. The City also began live-streaming City Council Meetings in 2018 and routinely uses its six social media platforms to showcase video segments.

"If you're not using video to connect with people, you're not connecting with people. Every piece of relevant data tells us that," Snow said. "It's a visual world in the palm of our hands and that's where we intend to meet our residents."


Evans receives grant to help restore Riverside Park

Riverside Park will receive another round of improvements after the City of Evans received a Grant from Colorado Youth Corps Association and Great Outdoors Colorado for \$47,400. The funds will be used to clean areas of residual brush and debris from the 2013 & 2015 floods that ravaged the historic area of Evans. The work will take place along the banks of the South Platte River, in the Southwest corner of Riverside Park.

“This is a tremendous boost for us as a community,” Evans Code Enforcement Manager Kyle Fehr, said. “The work we will be able to do will help the environment and enhance the aesthetics of a popular walking trail in Evans.”

Funds for the project were awarded to CYCA by GOCO, which receives a portion of Colorado Lottery revenues to invest in parks, playgrounds, trails, rivers, wildlife, youth corps and open space. The goal of the program is to employ youth and young adults (ages 14-25) throughout the state on critical outdoor recreation and land conservation projects. The City of Evans will receive six weeks of work from the Weld County Youth Conservation Corps and a saw crew. The Riverside Park project must be completed by December 31, 2020.

“We are honored to have the support of great organizations like CYCA and GOCO and we’re going to take advantage of their generosity.”



The Road Ahead looks promising for the City of Evans. Several infrastructure and street projects have been completed in 2019, with more upgrades in the blueprints for 2020.



New Streetlights, irrigation installed at 35th Avenue | Complete



The 35th Avenue widening project was effectively complete in mid-August. All lanes opened to traffic and the road is fully functional. In addition to the primary infrastructure, new streetlights have been installed along with irrigation. Landscaping will continue into 2020.



Striping scheduled for the 2019 Surface Treatment Project | Complete



The 2019 Asphalt Surface Treatment launched on September 25, 2019. The project restored, renewed, and increased the longevity of asphalt on strategic streets in the City of Evans. The project included three arterial roadways and three collector streets in six priority areas.



Road open at 31st St. & HWY 85 | Complete



The 31ST & Highway 85 Access Project is complete for the season and the road is open! The project broke ground in August of 2019 with the goal of enhancing safety and signal timing at the intersection of 31st Street and US Highway 85.



Evans first roundabout planned at 37th St. & 47th Ave | In-Progress

The City is in the design phase of widening 37th Street from 35th Avenue west to 65th Avenue as well as 47th Avenue north of 37th Street. As of November 2019, 30% of the plans have been reviewed and design is proceeding. Evans 1st roundabout Construction of the first phase, 47th Avenue, will take place next year.



37th Street Utilities Project & Overlay | In-Progress

The 37th Street Utilities Project is expected to be complete by end of January, 2020. Following the installation of the underground utilities, the City will begin installing a brand new surface to the thoroughfare. The 37th Street Utilities Project broke ground in May of 2019 with the goal of replacing aging underground utilities before repaving the road in 2020. The project is progressing in four stages: sanitary sewer replacement, water line replacement, storm sewer replacement, and finally a new surface for the road. The utility work is planned to be completed by the end of 2019 with a new surface on 37th Street from 23rd Avenue east to the railroad constructed in 2020.



23rd Ave, 2-Lane Extension | In-Progress

A brand new road is in the blueprints at 23rd Ave and 37th Street. The City will construct 2-lanes of 23rd Avenue south from 37th Street to 42nd Street next year. This will provide another entry and exit point for new developments in the corridor. The road will be further expanded to a four-lane arterial standard in the coming years as the area develops.

Nuevas farolas, Riego Instalado en la Avenida 35 | Completa ✓

El proyecto de ampliación de la avenida 35 se completó efectivamente a mediados de agosto. Todos los carriles se abrieron al tráfico y el camino es completamente funcional. Además de la infraestructura primaria, se han instalado nuevas farolas junto con riego. Paisajismo continuará en 2020



Rayado Fijado para el Proyecto de Tratamiento de Superficie 2019 | Completa ✓

El tratamiento de superficie de asfalto de 2019 se lanzó el 25 de septiembre de 2019. El proyecto restauró, renovó y aumentó la longevidad del asfalto en calles estratégicas de la ciudad de Evans. El proyecto incluyó tres vías arteriales y tres calles colectoras en seis áreas prioritarias



Primera Rotonda de Evans Prevista en la Calle 37 y Avenida 47 | Completa ✓

La ciudad está en la fase de diseño de ampliar la calle 37 desde la avenida 35 oeste hacia la avenida 65, así como la avenida 47 al norte de la calle 37. A noviembre de 2019, el 30% de los planes han sido revisados y el diseño está en curso. Evans primera ronda La construcción de la primera fase, avenida 47th, se llevará a cabo el próximo año.



Obra de Servicios Públicos y Repavimentación calle 37 | En Proceso

Se espera que la obra de Servicios Públicos de la calle 37 se complete para fines de 2019 o principios de 2020. Luego de la instalación de los servicios públicos subterráneos, la Ciudad comenzará a instalar una superficie completamente nueva en la vía pública. El Proyecto de Servicios Públicos de la calle 37 se inició en mayo de 2019 con el objetivo de reemplazar los servicios públicos subterráneos viejos antes de repavimentar la carretera en 2020. El proyecto está progresando en cuatro etapas: reemplazo de alcantarillado sanitario, reemplazo de la línea de agua, reemplazo de alcantarillado pluvial y finalmente un nuevo superficie para el camino. Está previsto que el trabajo de servicios públicos se complete a fines de 2019 con una nueva superficie en la calle 37 desde la avenida 23 este hasta el ferrocarril construido en 2020.



Calle 31 y Carretera 85 Abierto | En Proceso

El camino está abierto en la calle 31 y carretera 85 y se espera que el trazado de líneas finalice a mediados de noviembre. Se espera que el proyecto se complete a fines de noviembre. El proyecto de control de acceso de la calle 31 y carretera 85 se inició en agosto de 2019 con el objetivo de mejorar la seguridad y la sincronización de los semáforos en la intersección de la Calle 31 y Carretera 85.



Avenida 23, Extensión de 2 carriles | En Proceso

Una calle nueva está en los planos en la Avenida 23rd y Calle 37th. La ciudad construirá 2 carriles de la avenida 23 sur desde la calle 37 hasta la calle 42 el próximo año. Esto proporcionará otro punto de entrada y salida para nuevos desarrollos en el corredor. El camino se ampliará aún más a un estándar arterial de cuatro carriles en los próximos años a medida que se desarrolle el área.



Tip-A-Cop Raises Money for Colorado Special Olympics

On Thursday, December 5th, the Evans and Greeley Police Departments joined forces to participate in the Tip-A-Cop fundraiser at Texas Roadhouse in Greeley. The annual event invites members of local law enforcement agencies to become waiters and waitresses for the night, helping out with food service and refills. This year Weld County District Attorney, Michael Rourke, was even on hand as a patron for the fundraiser.

During Tip-A-Cop customers are seated for their meal and an officer or Special Olympics athlete comes to talk to them at their table. Customers are provided an envelope which they can leave their donation in if they wish.

Among the Evans Police Officers that volunteered their time was Officer Teresa McClatchey.

"When all the tips were counted, we found out that we were able to raise over \$2300 for Special Olympics of Colorado this year," said Officer McClatchey. "It's amazing to see so many people willing to donate money to this incredible organization."

The Tip-A-Cop fundraiser helps support Special Olympics in a number of ways, most notably helping with funding sporting equipment, ribbons, medals, and other supplies and awards.





Cops Fighting Cancer

For seventeen years now Cops Fighting Cancer has taken place annually to brighten the days of children affected by cancer, and to show support for the tough fight these young ones are up against. Sergeant Rob Wardlaw of the Evans Police Department has participated in the event each of the past four years and says he didn't know what true bravery was until he saw it firsthand.



"People often describe police officers as strong or brave which is true, however I did not know the meaning of strong and brave until I started attending Cops Fighting Cancer," Wardlaw says. "Over the last four years I have met dozens of children at the hospital. Some of these kids have been there for weeks, months or years and may never get to leave. I can say without a doubt that not one of the kids I have met had a bad attitude or complained about their situation. These children are the epitome of strength, and I think that I get more from them than they do from me. They really show me how attitude is everything and they help me to be a better person."

The Cops Fighting Cancer event draws in hundreds of officers around the state of Colorado to participate each year. The Aurora PD organizes the event and officers are assigned to different floors of the Children's Hospital in Aurora where they get to meet the children and their families while handing out gifts donated by citizens from numerous Colorado cities. Sgt. Wardlaw says that this year over 30 different Colorado law enforcement agencies participated, sending around 300 officers total. This is the fourth year that Evans PD has participated in Cops Fighting Cancer.

"Four years ago, I learned about the event and was able to take a few officers with me," Wardlaw says. "I plan on attending as long as this event goes on."

In addition to making an impact on the children individually, Cops Fighting Cancer also brings awareness to Aurora's Children's Hospital and awareness to the long-reaching impact of cancer in general. The cruelty of cancer can affect anyone, even these boys and girls who have to fight the illness from an early age.

"This event touches hundreds of people each year," Wardlaw says. "Both the children and families that are at the hospital each year look forward to the officers coming and spending time with them. This event not only has an impact on the children, but it has a huge impact on the officers."

Santa Cops Deliver Christmas Cheer

Each year, Santa Cops of Weld County makes it their mission to gather and distribute toys to children who would normally go without gifts for Christmas. The Weld chapter of the Santa Cops organization was started by the Greeley Police Department back in 1986, and the Evans Police Department has been a proud contributor to the cause along with virtually every other law enforcement entity across Weld County.



Officer Teresa McClatchey of the Evans PD is a supporter of Santa Cops and its activities, and said that a number of volunteers helped make Evans Santa Cops a big success in 2019.

"I would estimate 50 volunteers helped with packaging and transporting the gifts as well as organizing the Christmas party itself," McClatchey said.

Santa Cops takes toy donations all year long. In 2019, Evans Police Officers kicked off the season of giving after Thanksgiving by posting outside of Wal-Mart and spreading the word to shoppers they would be accepting toy donations that day. Evans PD continued to gather toys up until Christmas Eve by giving residents the opportunity to drop off their new and unwrapped gifts at the Evans Police Department. The Evans Santa Cops also held a Christmas party at the Evans Community Complex where children and their families could meet and get their photos with Santa, enjoy some refreshments, and receive their generously donated gifts.



"It's our goal to make sure every child gets to enjoy the holidays," McClatchey said. "We're happy to be able to help make the season brighter for kids and their families who are struggling."





Keep Your Pets Warm In The Winter

The Weld County Humane Society provides tips to keep your fur babies from suffering in the cold.

Animals are people too. Alright, maybe that's not true, but the reality is that animals get cold like people, too.

"In cold weather, animals need to have food, water, and shelter," Elaine Hicks, Executive Director at the Weld County Humane Society, said. "And that shelter has to consist of more than just a doghouse. It has to have hay, blankets, anything to keep the animal warm."

Basic needs are often overlooked when it comes to caring for animals in the winter.

"What's most important though, is to make sure the water doesn't freeze. In the really extreme cold, keep animals in the garage. Or, if you can let them in, let them inside because the elements are just too brutal for animals—especially with short hair."


32 degrees is the number to monitor. When the temperature dips below freezing, it's time to pull pets indoors—especially pets who are not bred to withstand the cold.

"It's your short-haired dogs that have more of an issue. Your Labs, your Shar Pei's, your Cocker Spaniels, Chihuahuas —those animals can't really tolerate the cold."

Cats have the most difficult time adapting to the winter elements, so the Humane Society strongly recommends that cats remain indoors. If they cannot retain a consistent indoor habitat, cat owners are encouraged to construct a warm outdoor habitat with blankets, hay, and heating elements.



2020 Census will be crucial for Evans and Weld County

Why It Matters

Hospitals. Fire departments. Schools. Even roads and highways. The census can shape many different aspects of your community. Each year, the results help determine how more than \$675 billion in federal funding is distributed to states and communities. It's also mandated by the Constitution: The U.S. has counted its population every 10 years since 1790.

What to Expect in 2020

By April 2020, households will receive an invitation to participate in the census. You'll then have three options to respond: online, by phone, or by mail. We'll mark Census Day on April 1, 2020, with events across the country. This is a key date for the 2020 count: When completing the census, you'll note where you are living on April 1.

Am I Required to Respond to the Census?

Yes, all people living in the United States, Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands are required by law to be counted in the 2020 Census.

Why It's Required

Getting a complete and accurate census count is critically important. That's why your response is required by law. If you do not respond, the U.S. Census Bureau will follow up in person to collect the information.

Why is the census so important? The results are used to determine how many seats your state gets in Congress. State and local officials also use census counts to draw boundaries for congressional districts, state legislative districts, and school districts.

And just as you are required by law to participate, the Census Bureau is bound by law to protect your answers. Your responses are used only to produce statistics. The Census Bureau does not disclose any personal information.

Starting in 2019, you may begin to notice census takers in your neighborhood. This is a normal part of the 2020 Census preparation and data collection process. Census field representatives will also continue to collect information for the American Community Survey (ACS) and other ongoing surveys.



Why Does the Census Bureau Do This?

You might see census takers in your neighborhood for a few different reasons:

- They are verifying addresses in preparation for the census.
- They are collecting responses to the census or another survey.
- They are dropping off census materials.
- They are conducting quality checks on the census.



Census takers who verify addresses are called address canvassers. They help ensure an accurate and complete count by verifying address lists across a wide area of physical geography, housing structures, and residence types. Part of this effort involves census takers on the ground noting where houses, apartments, shelters, and other residences are located.

Census takers will begin visiting homes in 2020 to collect responses from those who did not respond online, by phone, or by mail. At the same time, there will be other surveys ongoing, such as the American Community Survey, so there will also be census field representatives visiting homes for other reasons as well.

How Can I Verify the Identity of a Census Worker?

If you are visited by someone from the U.S. Census Bureau, here are some tips to assure the validity of the field representative:

- Census takers must present an ID badge that includes a photograph of the field representative, a Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date.
- Note that census workers may be carrying a Census Bureau phone or a laptop as well as a bag with a Census Bureau logo.
- If you still have questions, call 800-923-8282 to speak with a local Census Bureau representative.

How Can I Avoid Being Visited at Home by Census Workers?

The best way to avoid being visited at home is to fill out your 2020 Census online, by phone, or by mail. Households will receive an invitation to begin participating in the census by April 1, 2020.

This is the first time ever that you'll be able to respond to the census online!




