Opinions vary on legalizing retail Cannabis in Evans

The City of Evans held a pair of public forums that encouraged Evans residents to express their opinions on the legalization of retail marijuana within city limits.

There were two meetings and no shortage of opinions.

Neither for or against: *"I need to know as a constituent, what the city has planned, and I'm really glad for this meeting. That there is some thought process going into it and we're advancing in a way that says: "We're going to listen to your input first."*

For it: *"I am a business owner and I don't see a problem with it as long as they follow the city and state guidelines."*

For it: *"I own a business also and I wouldn't have a problem with it."*

Against it: *"Speaking for the children. They see enough. Do we really need to place more [marijuana] around those kids?"*

Against it: *"I'm actually not supportive of this idea, but if it were to go forward, as constrictive as it could be is where I would be leaning?"*

Against it: *"I just think there's a safer way to get the funding for our community than to be selling marijuana."*

The second meeting was broadcast live on Facebook, where residents were encouraged to provide input. Of the 29 comments submitted, no one expressed opposition to the legalization of retail marijuana in Evans and more than half of the comments expressed direct support. "Our City Council has put a tremendous amount of research into the subject and we want to hear from our residents. It's their city and we want this to be their decision."





Infrastructure Update



37th Street Utilities Project

The 37th Street Utilities Project is replacing undersized and aged utility infrastructure prior to resurfacing 37th Street from 23rd Avenue east to the railroad tracks in 2020. In advance of the overlay project, curb and gutter will be replaced, handicap ramps will be installed or upgraded, and portions of sidewalk will be replaced.

The project is progressing in three, primary segments:

- Sanitary sewer replacement extending from 11th Avenue to 17th Avenue
- Water line replacement from Latham to 23rd Avenue
- Storm sewer replacement east to the railroad tracks



35th Avenue Widening nearing completion

The 35th Avenue Widening Project is nearing completion. Entering the month of July, the work scheduled to be complete includes:

- Median curb and gutter installation
- East side curb and gutter installation
- Final Paving
- New streetlights following the final paving

The 35th Avenue widening project will deliver a four-lane arterial standard for north and southbound traffic between 37th Street and Prairie View Drive.



New service road coming to Highway 85 and 31st Street

The City plans to break ground on a new service road at Highway 85 and 31st Street during the summer of 2019. The goal is to increase safety at the intersection of Highway 85 and 31st Street. The project will separate the service road from Highway 85, reduce congestion, and simplify traffic flow. A new road will be routed west from the service road on Southgate Drive and then south to 31st Street. The City will also close a portion of the west service road at the intersection.

The City will send another public notice to residents in the affected areas when the exact dates of construction are finalized. The anticipated completion date is the fall of 2019.

Infrastructure Update



Proyecto de utilidades de la Calle 37

El Proyecto de Servicios Públicos de la Calle 37 está reemplazando la tubería de tamaño insuficiente y envejecido de servicios públicos antes de volver a pavimentar la Calle 37 desde la Avenida 23 al este hasta las vías del tren en 2020. Con anticipación al proyecto de recubrimiento, se reemplazarán las banquetas y las canaletas, se instalarán o mejorarán las rampas para discapacitados, y partes de la banqueta serán reemplazadas.

El proyecto avanza en tres segmentos primarios:

- Reemplazo del alcantarillado sanitario que se extiende desde la Avenida 11 hasta la Avenida 17
- Reemplazo de la línea de agua de Latham a la Avenida 23
- Reemplazo de alcantarillado de tormenta al este de las vías del tren.

Ampliación de la Avenida 35 a punto de terminar

El proyecto de ampliación de la Avenida 35 está a punto de completarse. Al ingresar el mes de julio, el trabajo programado para completarse incluye:

- Instalación del camellón y canaletas.
- Instalación de banquetas y canaletas en el lado este
- Pavimentación final
- Nuevas luces después del pavimento final.

El proyecto de ampliación de la Avenida 35 constará con un estándar arterial de cuatro carriles para el tráfico en dirección norte y sur entre la Calle 37 y Prairie View Drive. Street and Prairie View Drive.

Nueva carretera de servicio que llega a la Autopista 85 y la Calle 31

La Ciudad planea abrir una nueva carretera de servicio en la Autopista 85 y la Calle 31 durante el verano de 2019. El objetivo es aumentar la seguridad en la intersección de la Autopista 85 y la Calle 31. El proyecto separará la carretera de servicio de la Autopista 85, reducirá la congestión y simplificará el flujo de tráfico. Una nueva ruta se dirigirá hacia el oeste desde la carretera de servicio en Southgate Drive y luego hacia el sur hasta la Calle 31. La Ciudad también cerrará una parte de la carretera de servicio oeste en la intersección.

La Ciudad enviará otro aviso público a los residentes en las áreas afectadas cuando se tengan las fechas exactas para terminar la construcción. La fecha prevista para terminar es en otoño del 2019.

"The best part is that this is truly our park," Amanda Castle, Evans' resident and City Council Member said. "The city asked us what we wanted here. We told them and they made it a reality. We're so thankful."

Aside from the new park's pleasing aesthetics, the area features a walking trail and pergola. It is trimmed with a 6' concrete loop trail and has room for a potential restroom and playground. With the addition of 34th Street Park, the City of Evans is now home to 13 parks scattered throughout the city. The park replaces the old municipal pool that was a mainstay in Evans for many years. Historic Riverside Park, on the east side of town, held its grand re-opening in October of 2018. Riverside Park had not been in use since the flood of 2013 ravaged the area adjacent to the South Platte River.

Evans Police debut the “Teen Police Academy”

The Citizens Police Academy took aim at a younger demographic in 2019. The Evans Police Department hosted the inaugural “Teen Police Academy”, a four-day event at Centennial Elementary that gave 6th, 7th, and 8th graders from the Evans-area an opportunity to learn the ropes of law enforcement.



“The class is normally offered to adults in the fall,” Evans Community Resource Officer Teresa McClatchey, said. “But this year we wanted to connect with the kiddos and show them what it’s like to be a Police Officer.”

During the three-hour sessions, students shadowed the Evans Police Officers at rotating stations. The students learned routine traffic stop procedures, fingerprinting, traffic radar techniques, and many more law enforcement simulations.



“It’s important to have positive experiences with Law Enforcement at a young age,” Evans Police Officer Bobby Gallegos said. “It leaves a lasting impression on them and instills a sense of respect for the profession. Who knows? This may inspire some of them to pursue a career in law enforcement.”

The program is part of the Greeley-Evans School District 6 Summer Enrichment Program and welcomes students from schools across the district.

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Evans based Soccer Without Borders receives national recognition

Naw Ophi was born in a Thailand refugee camp before fleeing to the United States at four years old.

The Women's World Cup has the attention of the sports world during the summer of 2019, and that spotlight shined brightly on Evans based Soccer Without Borders. Fox Sports aired a four-minute feature on Naw Ophi, an immigrant who was born in a refugee camp in Thailand and moved to the United States at four-years-old.

That's when Evans-based Soccer Without Borders entered her life. The organization uses soccer as a tool to help immigrants and refugees like Ophi adapt to life in the United States. During the globally televised interview, Ophi said it was difficult to adjust to North American Culture when she first arrived on American soil.



Soccer is the language that brings them together.

"Since you don't know the language, it's really a barrier. They said I looked Chinese and stuff and they would just talk to us but they wouldn't understand it, so they would point at us and laugh."

Soccer Without Borders has so many success stories, it's difficult to tell them all. Ophi is a shining example of soccer's ability to unite people from across cultures and across the globe.

Mary McVeigh Connor is the Co-Founder and Executive Director of Soccer Without Border. She said kids across Soccer Without Borders come from 68 different countries and speak over 55 different languages.

"Soccer is the language that brings them together. You can go anywhere in the world and find a pickup soccer game. That's pretty powerful."


Ophi fell in love with soccer immediately.

"Since I was little, I had the ball in my feet. When I learned about Soccer Without Borders, I knew I wanted to play."

2020 Census will be crucial for Evans and Weld County

Why It Matters

Hospitals. Fire departments. Schools. Even roads and highways. The census can shape many different aspects of your community. Each year, the results help determine how more than \$675 billion in federal funding is distributed to states and communities. It's also mandated by the Constitution: The U.S. has counted its population every 10 years since 1790.

What to Expect in 2020

By April 2020, households will receive an invitation to participate in the census. You'll then have three options to respond: online, by phone, or by mail. We'll mark Census Day on April 1, 2020, with events across the country. This is a key date for the 2020 count: When completing the census, you'll note where you are living on April 1.

Am I Required to Respond to the Census?

Yes, all people living in the United States, Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands are required by law to be counted in the 2020 Census.

Why It's Required

Getting a complete and accurate census count is critically important. That's why your response is required by law. If you do not respond, the U.S. Census Bureau will follow up in person to collect the information.

Why is the census so important? The results are used to determine how many seats your state gets in Congress. State and local officials also use census counts to draw boundaries for congressional districts, state legislative districts, and school districts.

And just as you are required by law to participate, the Census Bureau is bound by law to protect your answers. Your responses are used only to produce statistics. The Census Bureau does not disclose any personal information.

Starting in 2019, you may begin to notice census takers in your neighborhood. This is a normal part of the 2020 Census preparation and data collection process. Census field representatives will also continue to collect information for the American Community Survey (ACS) and other ongoing surveys.


Hispanic Influence through the Spanish Colony and the "Greeley Grays"

The influence of Hispanic culture in Weld County is palpable and made possible by the arrival of the Spanish Colony in nearby Greeley.

In 1924, a group of approximately 45 Hispanic families migrated from the southwestern United States to northern Greeley, where they formed a small community later known as the "Spanish Colony." The sugar beet factory, owned by Great Western Sugar Co., was experiencing an economic boom at the time and the workers came to Northern Colorado to find good work and decent pay. Within a few months of working in fields gathering sugar beets, the workers built small adobe houses near the factory upon an offer from Great Western to do so. The relationship meant that the workers and their families could have permanent housing. It also meant that the factory would be able to ensure that its workforce did not have to commute long distances.

The work in the beet fields was hard, and one of the ways the Colony would blow off steam after a long week of labor was through baseball. The Colony formed several local teams, and as time went on these teams combined their greatest talents to form a singular team simply known as the "Spanish Colony Team." In 1938 they became known as the "Greeley Grays," a name inspired by the Negro League's "Homestead Grays."

Alvin Garcia, who was a part of one of the original Spanish Colony families, was originally a bat boy for the Grays and eventually became the team's manager until 1969. During his tenure, he saw the team go semi-pro in 1942 and saw several Grays players go on to play professionally in the MLB. Garcia's contributions to the Hispanic community and to the community as a whole were vast, and you can even find a tile portrait commemorating his achievements outside of the Greeley History Museum. The Grays also continue to be a fixture in the community in the present day, playing their home games at Nelson Farm Baseball field in nearby Johnstown.






Evans Celebrates 150 Years:

Complaints and Criticism in Local Government

During a visit to the Greeley History Museum, we found a strongly worded letter amongst the historical materials they had archived there relating to the City of Evans. It may seem tame and overly eloquent by today's standards, but this was likely a real ripper back in the day. Here's a transcription of the letter in case the elaborate penmanship is a little hard to make out:



To W.C. Sanders, Esq.

Dear Sir!

As a citizen of the County of Weld and a Tax-payer in said County: I hereby demand of you, as the County Clerk of said County of Weld in the Territory of Colorado, that you proceed with all convenient speed to bring back to the Town of Evans, which is the County Seat of said County of Weld, all the Books, papers, stationary, furniture and other property belonging to or appertaining to your said Office of County Clerk of said Weld County, the said Books, papers, stationary, furniture and other property having been removed from said Evans without authority, and in case of your refusal to do so, an application for a Mandamus will be made to compel you to do so.



Evans Celebrates 150 Years: Remembering the Evans Courier



A few times throughout Evans history the town had its own newspaper. In the 1980s for instance, Evans had a local newspaper called the Evans Star Press. Go back much further to the turn of the twentieth century and there's the Evans Courier, a newspaper that was delivered to Evans' residents on Saturdays and kept them up to date with the local comings and goings as well as providing them with information about the far reaches of the world.

The Greeley History Museum still contains archived copies of the Courier from as early as 1902. The contents provide a look at life in those times that seems to mirror our own, and yet also shows how much we've changed in the last century simultaneously.

Issues of the Courier contained many segments that would seem familiar today in the Greeley Tribune or Denver Post: "Late Washington News and Congressional Proceedings;" "Wit and Humor," featuring comic drawings or humorous observations; and "World News," for instance.

The paper also contained advertisements of all kinds. The contents of those advertisements reflect much different times however: prevalent mentions of miracle cures, tonics, tooth powders and cough syrups; ads for deals on men's and women's fashions (one men's ad promised "\$8 suits for \$5"); and callouts for local businesses such as John H. Behrens Lumber (from Evans) and Levin Brothers Shoes (based out of Greeley, and selling "W.L. Douglas Shoes - The Best Shoes In the World!").

Arguably one of the most entertaining portions of the Courier was "The Odd Corner" section, which contained everything from poetry to real and fictional short stories. There were also mentions of fashions, gossip and other entertainment of the time, reminding us that there has always been a healthy mix of hard-hitting news and the lighter fare that colors our daily lives.






