37th Street Capital Improvement Project set to break ground in May

EVANS, CO—The City of Evans is set to break ground on the 37th Street Utilities Project in early May. The much-anticipated Capital Improvement Project will take place on 37th Street in Evans, between 23rd Avenue and the railroad tracks east of Highway 85. The utility project will be completed prior to the restoration of the driving surface of 37th Street within the limits described above.

"Our residents deserve quality roads to drive on and this project is a positive step towards improving the primary thoroughfare in Evans." Director Ready

The City intends to maintain a minimum of 2-way traffic on 37th Street during the duration of the project. Residents and commuters should not anticipate road closures during construction; however, they may encounter traffic pattern shifts at various times during the construction. Electronic road signs will notify drivers of any potential traffic changes.

"We're thrilled that this project is coming to fruition," Evans Public Works Director Randy Ready, said.

The project will progress in three, primary segments:

- Sanitary sewer replacement extending from 11th Avenue to 17th Avenue
- Water line replacement from Latham Avenue to 23rd Avenue
- Storm sewer replacement that will be limited to east of Highway 85, to the railroad tracks

Greeley-based Duran Excavating is the general contractor. The 37th Street Utilities Project will replace undersized and aged utility infrastructure prior to the restoration (overlay) of specific portions of 37th Street in early 2020. As part of the overlay project, curb and gutter will be replaced, handicap ramps will be installed or upgraded, and portions of sidewalk will be replaced.

The 37th Street Utilities Project construction budget is \$2.3 million dollars and will be partially funded through a DOLA grant in the amount of \$1 million dollars. The remaining \$1.3 million dollars will be funded through the City of Evans water, sewer, and storm sewer Capital Improvement Fund.

"Evans has made street maintenance and repair a priority and 37th Street is crucial to the vitality of this city," City Manager Jim Becklenberg, said. "It is the most-used street in Evans, so we need ensure it remains a healthy thoroughfare for anyone who travels through our city."

No additional rights-of-ways or easements were required for the project.

Sewer and water service outages lasting a few hours should be expected. Affected residents will be notified ahead of time via mail, door hangers and social media so they can prepare. 2019 Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics

EVANS, Colo. – The annual fundraising effort for Special Olympics Colorado known as the Law Enforcement Torch Run (LETR) will be making its way through Evans and the surrounding areas once again on May 29th. In addition to providing added funding and for raising public awareness of the Special Olympics as a whole, LETR is also committed to “changing the future for people with intellectual disabilities and lighting the way for acceptance and inclusion” according to LETR’s Vice President, Jan Gordon.

Members of law enforcement as well as athletic competitors in the Special Olympics who are selected to carry the “Flame of Hope” in the Torch Run are known as “Guardians of the Flame.” The Torch Run is an important part of the Opening Ceremonies of the Special Olympics, not just on the state and local level, but also nationally and even worldwide. On a global scale, over 97,000 members of law enforcement dedicate their time and effort to participating in carrying the “Flame of Hope.” On May 29th, the Torch Run will make its way across Weld County where thirteen local law enforcement agencies will help with raising funds and carrying the torch through Evans and Greeley, eventually ending up at Island Grove Park.

“Hundreds of people come out to cheer on everyone during the Torch Run,” said Officer Teresa McClatchey of the Evans Police Department. “It’s a huge event.”

The Greeley Police Department takes the lead on organizing the Torch Run through the Weld County area, and they even provide motorcycle units to escort the “Guardians of the Flame” during the Torch Run. Pinning down an exact time for when the run will make its way through Evans is tricky and based upon how quickly the runners move from checkpoint to checkpoint, but estimates are that the runners should come through the Evans area around 10:30-11:00am.

“District 6 Summer Adventures”

Lets Kids Experience the Evans Police and Fire Academies

EVANS, Colo. – This summer, kids in Greeley and Evans can attend a variety of enrichment programs as part of the Weld County School System’s “District 6 Summer Adventures.” From June 3rd to June 27th, kids from kindergarten through 8th grade can participate in a variety of different activities at Centennial Elementary and Chappelow Arts Magnet schools in Evans, and Martinez Elementary in Greeley. Not only are the activities free for kids who are already enrolled in K-8 in District 6, but free transportation to the schools is available and breakfast and lunch are also provided.

Among the many summer “adventures” that are planned for kids in 2019 are the mini Evans Fire Academy for kids in 3rd through 5th grade, and the mini Evans Police Academy for kids in 6th through 8th grade.

From June 10th through the 13th kids can attend the Evans Fire Academy at Centennial Elementary which will “cover fire safety, home escape, basic first aid and the job requirements and duties of a firefighter.” The program promises hands-on activities that will “provide the students with knowledge and skills to ensure their safety and the safety of others.”

From June 24th through the 27th the Evans Police Academy course will be available, also at Centennial Elementary. This course “is designed to build a positive relationship between the students of Evans and their community police officers.” Among the vast array of topics this program intends to cover are crime scene investigations, police officer roles and responsibilities, accident investigation, traffic situations, and SWAT.



Evans Day of Play Returns, June 1st

EVANS, Colo. – Zach Kilimann is the Senior Program Coordinator for the Greeley chapter of an organization known as Soccer Without Borders (SWB), and for the second year in a row he and a group of kids from this chapter will be present to play the world's most popular sport with kids in Evans attending the 2019 Day of Play.

The annual Evans Day of Play will be held this year on Saturday, June 1st from 10:30am-12:30pm at Evans City Park. The event is celebrating its third year in 2019 and was initially created as a way for kids and adults alike to take advantage of all the great parks that Evans offers its residents.

"We came up with the idea because we noticed the parks weren't being utilized," said Officer Teresa McClatchey. "We wanted people to get out into the parks and enjoy them and give kids something to do in the summer."

The Day of Play is organized each year by Evans' own Riverside Library and maintains the support of the Evans Parks and Recreation department, the Evans Police Department, and the Evans Fire Department. Among the activities planned is an agility course put together by Team Tom, kickball, information about the library's summer reading program, and a "mini bicycle rodeo" put together by Evans PD to teach kids about signaling and being safe on city streets. The library also provides fresh fruit and waters at no cost, and the entire Day of Play itself is free for residents to participate in. Food trucks are also expected to be on site for those looking for good local eats.

The aforementioned Soccer Without Borders kids will also be present to play games with attendees.

"Soccer Without Borders' mission is to use soccer as a vehicle for change," Kilimann says of the organization. "Soccer is such a special sport because it's universal. You don't need a lot of equipment or money to play, all you need is a pair of cleats and a ball."

Kilimann and SWB are proud to be a part of the Day of Play once again because of this universality.

"The Day of Play provides an awesome opportunity for families to come out and celebrate the diversity of the community, and more importantly, for the community to just come out and play," he says. "We're excited to bring soccer and community building activities to the event."

SWB Greeley, since 2011, has helped provide an outlet for kids from 14 different countries who speak 11 different languages to find their place in our community. The Greeley chapter has also made it a point to engage girls in the program, who make up 34% of the program's participants. SWB Greeley is also inclusive of refugees from 4 of the 10 countries with the highest levels of migration to Colorado from 2010-2015. The kids use their love of the sport to not only build friendships and find a sense of belonging here in Greeley/Evans, but also as a vessel to learn English and to continue higher learning.

"Our three pillars are soccer, community and education," Kilimann says.

2019 Evans Storefront Improvement Program

Now accepting Applications!

- Thinking of painting your commercial building? Changing out windows?
- How about re-stripping the parking lot or replacing landscaping?
- Thinking of doing other exterior improvements to your storefront?



The City of Evans **Storefront Improvement Program** is a reimbursement program intended to encourage property owners and tenants to re-invest in and renovate the exteriors of their buildings. Revitalizing building facades is key to enhancing the visual appearance of the community and attracting new business. Properties that have been renovated have consistently benefited from increased customer visits and sales.

For 2019 there is a total of \$15,000 available for the program, with up to \$5,000 available to each approved property.

Properties located within the Historic Evans or Highway 85 Corridor Redevelopment Areas will be considered first if they submit application for the program prior to June 1. All other eligible properties may apply prior to June 1, but will not be considered for funding until June 1, subject to available funds, and will be placed in order of applications received.



A licensed contractor shall be used for projects exceeding \$500 in value and if work involves electrical, plumbing or heating and ventilation. For projects using a licensed contractor located within the City of Evans, up to 60% of the project may be reimbursed up to a maximum of \$5,000; for projects using a licensed contractor located outside of the City of Evans, up to 40% of the project may be reimbursed up to a maximum of \$5,000.

There are additional application requirements for property owners or business tenants, and a construction schedule designed to see a timely completion and reimbursement of qualifying improvements.

361 lbs collected on Drug-Take-Back Day

The Evans Police Department hosted Drug-Take-Back Day on the final Saturday of April. Evans residents submitted nearly 400 pounds of unused or prescription drugs during the 4-hour event at Sam's Club in Evans.

"It's always a great event," Cody Thomason, who is a member of the Evans Police Force, said. "It's encouraging to see our community doing the right thing with their unused medications. It shows they care about their friends and neighbors and want to live in a safe city."

Evans Police Chief Rick Brandt believes that disposing of expired or unused prescription drugs can be a matter of life and death.

"Properly discarding medications can save your life," Brandt said. "Almost everyone has old, unused medications in their cabinets. This day gives our residents an opportunity to safely dispose of those drugs. It also gives them an opportunity to keep their family and loved ones safe."

Drug Take Back day is typically held twice a year, in the spring and the fall. Prescription Drug Take Back is a national Drug Enforcement Agency program focused on providing convenient and secure locations for the public to drop off excess, unused and

expired controlled substances and other medications. Removing these medications from the home and disposing of them safely reduces accidental overdose and harm. For more information, call Officer McClatchey at 970-590-1504.

EVANS, Colo. - The City of Evans is proud to welcome a new officer into the Evans Police Department, Officer Todd Ediger. Officer Ediger was sworn in on the morning of April 22nd in the council chambers at the Evans Community Complex. His immediate family was on hand to attend the ceremony: wife Renee, and sons Ethan, Evan, Elias and Emmanuel. Evans Police Chief Rick Brandt was among the other officials present at the ceremony, and was witness to another attendee who had a special role in the swearing-in.

"[Officer Ediger's] best friend Sgt. James Westerfield of the Larimer County Sheriff's Office pinned his badge," reported Chief Brandt.

Officer Ediger and Sgt. Westerfield became friends during their time together at the LCSO and have remained close since, even continuing to participate in martial arts training together off the clock.

"I am very excited about working for Evans PD," said Officer Ediger. "It is a top-notch organization and I'm excited to join such a dynamic team."

Officer Ediger was hired on December 31st, 2018 and is the first new officer to swear in for the Evans Police Department since January 2019 when three other new officers were instated. He brings five years of previous experience in law enforcement into the fold. In addition to working for the Larimer County Sheriff's Office, he also spent time as a patrol sergeant for the Platteville Police Department.

2020 Census will be crucial for Evans and Weld County

Greeley, CO--On a 38 degree morning late in April, Evans City Manager Jim Becklenberg joined Greeley Mayor John Gates and a host of community members from Northern Colorado on the steps of the Weld County courthouse. They were there to officially launch the 2020 Census Campaign.

"It is so important to raise awareness of the upcoming Census," Becklenberg said. "The City of Evans relies on the grant funding and legislative representation that comes from the Census. We need our community to participate and we believe that they will."

The Census will not officially take place until April 1st, 2020. That's when households will receive an invitation to participate in the census. Residents will have three options to respond: online, by phone, or by mail. Census Day will be marked with events across the country on April 1st. That is a key date for the 2020 count: When completing the census, residents will note where they are living on April 1.

"We can't stress the importance of the Census enough. Our schools, our roads, our infrastructure, and our community's say in state in local government are at stake," Becklenberg said.



Weld County is the 7th fastest growing MSA in the US

April 22, 2019 - The most recent Census Bureau data shows that El Paso County had the largest county increase in the state between 2017-2018 of 13,056 followed by Denver +11,053, Weld +9,031, Adams +7,440 and Douglas +7,104.

The largest growing county in the U.S. was Maricopa County, Arizona - with an increase of 81,224 - which is close to the entire state of Colorado's increase of 79,662. Four of the top 10 largest gaining counties were in Texas. The remaining six counties on the list were in Arizona, Nevada, California, Washington and Florida which had two.

Denver remains the largest populated county in the state at 716,492 but El Paso is not far behind at 713,856. There were gains in all but seven Colorado counties; marking a significant change from 2011 when 36 counties experienced population declines. The fastest growing county in the state was San Juan at 7.2% which also ranked the second fastest in the nation.

The counties in Colorado with the largest growth continued to be along the Front Range, representing eighty-five percent of the growth in the state. Counties with the fastest growth were primarily smaller rural counties except for Weld. The Greeley Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA), same as the Weld County geography, was the 7th fastest growing MSA in the US at 3.0% down from 3rd fastest in 2017. Park (3.5%) and Archuleta (3.4%) Counties ranked in the top 100 fastest growing counties with 10,000 or more population.

Net migration represents 65% of the population change in the state with the remaining 35% from natural increase (births-deaths). In many counties net migration is the only source of growth and in 14 counties there was net out migration this last year. Most counties have positive natural increase (more births than deaths) but 16 counties are experiencing natural declines up from only 8 last year.

Who We Are Looking For

The Evans Parks Department is seeking qualified candidates that bring a positive attitude to work each day. We're looking for active, solution-minded individuals that want to make a positive impact on their community.

What You Will Do

Potential candidates should be ready to perform park maintenance duties as instructed by the Parks Management team. Duties will include various combinations of the following: irrigate, mow, weed, trim, renovate, and fertilize turf areas. You may be required to plant, irrigate, prune, and remove trees, shrubs, bushes, and flowers.

During winter months, we clear snow and leaves.


Daily duties include removing trash and debris from rights-of-way, sidewalks, streets, and sports fields. Our crew empties trash receptacles and transports rubbish. We assist in the maintenance and installation of computerized park irrigation systems; assist in the cleaning of parks, restrooms, cemetery, park facilities and public grounds. We conduct safety inspections for all park facilities, playgrounds, equipment and public grounds and inform the supervisor of needed repairs.

You may be asked to perform a variety of tasks involving carpentry, cement, painting, plumbing, and electrical work. Candidates will be required to operate all necessary motorized equipment, including mowers, pickup and dump trucks, pick up truck mounted plows, front end loaders, backhoes, and similar equipment. Employees assist in performing routine service and maintenance on motor vehicles and equipment used on work assignments; maintains daily work and vehicle logs; sands, salts, and removes snow from city parking lots, streets, sidewalks and trails when necessary.

Also, be ready to prepare grave sites for burials. The right candidate may oversee the work of seasonal park maintenance workers and perform other duties as assigned.

WHO CAN PARTICIPATE?

All residents of the City of Evans, Colorado. Evans utility customers who pay for their trash service through their bill will receive a voucher in the mail.

MORE THAN 1 VOUCHER?

You can purchase additional vouchers at the event with proof of residency for \$10 per load (cash only). You can also buy additional vouchers at the Evans Community Complex during normal business hours (M-F, 8am-5pm). Trailers and loads larger than one pickup bed will require multiple vouchers.

CAN I BRING TIRES?

Waste tires will be accepted for an additional fee of \$2 per passenger vehicle tire without a wheel. All other tires will cost more. The second lowest fee will be \$7 for passenger vehicle tires with wheels.

WHAT YOU NEED TO BRING

Bring the free cleanup voucher attached to the bottom of this letter. You will also be *required to present proof of residency* in the form of a driver license or Evans utility bill verifying your address.

WHAT ITEMS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED?

Weld County recycling guides will be available at the event or from the City by request. The guide will help residents determine what items will **not be accepted** at the cleanup.

Examples of **unaccepted** items include:

electronics, motor oil, refrigerants, and household hazardous wastes such as paint, cleaning chemicals, and a variety of other items which require special disposal.


