CHECKING IN | CITY PROJECTS UPDATE

CITY OF EVANS INFRASTRUCTURE REPORT

The Road Ahead looks promising for the City of Evans. Several infrastructure and street projects have been completed in 2019, with more upgrades in the blueprints for 2020.



35th Avenue Widening | Complete ✓

The 35th Avenue widening project was effectively complete in mid-August. All lanes opened to traffic and the road is fully functional. October brings several aesthetic details that remain on small portions of roadway.



2019 Surface Treatment Project | Complete ✓

The 2019 Asphalt Surface Treatment launched on September 25, 2019. The project restored, renewed, and increased the longevity of asphalt on strategic streets in the City of Evans. The project included three arterial roadways and three collector streets in six priority areas.



31st St. & HWY 85 Access | In-Progress

The 31st St. & HWY 85 Access Control project broke ground in August of 2019 with the goal of enhancing safety and signal timing at the intersection of 31st Street and US Highway 85. At the intersection of the two roads, there are three streets that feed into the intersection, including West Service Road, 8th Ave, and State Street. All entry points are controlled by their own, separate traffic signals.



37th Street Utilities Project & Overlay | In-Progress

The 37th Street Utilities Project broke ground in May of 2019 with the goal of replacing aging underground utilities before repaving the road in 2020. The project is progressing in four stages: sanitary sewer replacement, water line replacement, storm sewer replacement, and finally a new surface for the road. The utility work is planned to be completed by the end of 2019 with a new surface on 37th Street from 23rd Avenue east to the railroad constructed in 2020.



23rd Ave, 2-Lane Extension | In-Progress

A brand new road is in the blueprints at 23rd Ave and 37th Street. The City will construct 2-lanes of 23rd Avenue south from 37th Street to 42nd Street next year. This will provide another entry and exit point for new developments in the corridor. The road will be further expanded to a four-lane arterial standard in the coming years as the area develops.



47th Ave Widening | In-Progress

The City is in the design phase of widening 37th Street from 35th Avenue west to 65th Avenue as well as 47th Avenue north of 37th Street. Completion of the entire corridor could take a decade or longer to complete and will be executed in phases. Construction of the first phase, 47th Avenue, will take place next year.



THE STORY OF OUR STREETS

The City of Evans is proud of the progress we're making to improve roads citywide, but we have much more work to do. Current funding is not sufficient to keep up with declining road conditions, and it could take decades to widen all major thoroughfares. More is needed to fund safe infrastructure that supports our local economy into the future.

WHAT'S NEXT ?

- **A 1% sales tax measure could be placed on the April 2020 ballot**
- **If passed, this would generate an additional \$3 Million annually**
- **The money would be used exclusively for road widening & repairs**



The additional revenue would fund...

Widening 37th St from 35th to 65th Ave (among others)
Tripling the street maintenance budget and work plan
Paving most dirt roads throughout the City



Why sales tax?

Holiday Lighting Ceremony officially signifies 150 years

When the clock strikes midnight on November 29th, the City of Evans will officially be 150 years old. 2019 has been a special year for the City of Evans, and the second annual Holiday Lighting Ceremony will be a fitting way to celebrate the city's Sesquicentennial Anniversary. The event will be held on Friday, November 29th from 6-8pm at the Evans Community Complex.

"150 years to the date," Evans Mayor Brian Rudy said. "We can't think of a better way to celebrate Evans 150th Anniversary. It's also a great opportunity for the community to rally together and celebrate the holidays with each other."

Evans has celebrated its Sesquicentennial Anniversary throughout 2019 with a long list of celebrations and milestone accomplishments. The City held its inaugural State of the City Address in September. The Evans Police Department sent another one of their Officers through the prestigious FBI Academy in Virginia. Evans Heritage Days expanded into a two-day celebration for the first time since 2009 and lit up the night sky with hot air balloons and a fireworks show that dropped the collective jaw of the Queen City of the South Platte.



"The Holiday Lighting Ceremony is the culmination of a year-long celebration," Evans Recreation Director Brian Stone said. "Last year's event was fantastic and we received so much positive feedback, that we had to do it again."

Along with the tree lighting ceremony, there will be several activities for families to enjoy. There will be live reindeer, face painting, and photos with Santa and Mrs. Claus. The event is free and open to the public. Anyone is welcome to attend.






NATIONAL Prescription DRUG TAKE BACK



The City of Evans Police Department held the bi-annual Drug-Take-Back Day at Sam's Club in Evans on the final Saturday of October, and resident participation did not disappoint. Participants dropped off 15 garbage bags, totaling 448 pounds of prescription drugs. In addition to the unused and expired prescription drugs, residents also contributed 3,326 pounds of personal documents that were shredded. Shredding is a way to get rid of unwanted paper material such as billing statements, receipts, tax records and anything containing your personal information.

Citizen's Police Academy Goes Behind the Scenes of Law Enforcement

Heather Utrata is the Community Development Technician for the City of Evans, and someone who jumped at the opportunity to join the Evans Police Department's Citizen's Police Academy. Over the span of 8 weeks, she and the rest of the program's attendees received first-hand experience in some of the training scenarios that officers are subjected to. Courses ranged from dealing with traffic accidents, to firearms training, to driving courses and crime scene investigations just to name a few.



"It was interesting to see specifically how officers handle certain situations, and how they handle the ins and outs of their daily lives," Utrata said. "After each course I was impressed by how confident and knowledgeable the officers have to be even when just pulling someone over for a traffic stop."

Not only did participants get to hear accounts of actual police scenarios from the officers themselves, but they also got to roll up their sleeves and take part in these trainings.

"Everything was super hands-on," Utrata said. "You really get to do something at all times. During one course we got to go to a dispatch center and hear calls coming through in real time. There was another where you had to pretend to enter a house after a disturbance call and go through the script of what you would say to a citizen in that situation."



She also mentioned how stressful and eye-opening these scenarios could be.

"When we were asked to do some of the scenarios ourselves, I actually felt fear about whether or not I was using the right terminology and wondering if I was portraying myself correctly," Utrata said.

Safety and Risk Manager Kurt Boudette was another City of Evans employee who attended the CPA this year. In one scenario Evans PD officers demonstrated the non-lethal stopping power of their tasers, and Kurt was actually one of the brave participants who volunteered to feel its effects.



The Citizen's Police Academy is a truly worthwhile experience that provides valuable insight into the operations of the Evans Police Department," Boudette said. "It is clear that the Evans Police Department maintains the highest level of professionalism and integrity, and deeply cares for the wellbeing of the community."

The Evans Citizen's Police Academy is not just a program for City employees, but for any local resident who is interested in finding out more about the practices of the police department. Demolition and Infrastructure

Improvements Underway Along Highway 85

Asbestos abatement and demolition of the eight buildings at the southeast corner of Highway 85 and 31st Street in Evans officially started the week of Monday, October 21st. Among the buildings tagged for demolition were the former Randy's Diner, Esh's Market and Evans Business Center due to deteriorating building conditions and the established goal of preparing the area for new growth. Demolition of this area is expected to be completed by the end of 2019. Between October and December of 2019, the City of Evans will be exploring options for future development of this area.

"Our goal with our development partners is identifying the best use for all of our parcels. It could be retail, housing, office, [or] lodging," said Economic Development Manager for the City of Evans, Allison Moeding. "Whatever it ends up being, we want it to encourage more development and private investment."

In addition to the development planning and demolition of this section of town, City staff also began planning infrastructure improvements to the Highway 85 corridor. Among these improvements are upgrades to the stormwater drainage between 31st Street and 37th Street, and realignment of existing frontage roads (specifically West Service Road on the west side, and State Street on the east side). Similar work has already been in progress on the northeast corner of the intersection (near Kum and Go) and has nearly been completed. Evans Celebrates 150 Years:

Warren Wiggins, Framer of the Peace Corps

One of Evans' most influential residents was Warren Wiggins, a man described as "one of the framers of the Peace Corps" by Sarah Arnusch in her book *Images of America: Evans*. Born in Arizona in 1923, Wiggins spent his formative years in Colorado and graduated from the Evans and Greeley schools. He then attended the University of Colorado, but left in order to serve in the Army Air Forces during World War II. When his service was complete, he came back to Colorado and finished his education at Colorado State.



Wiggins and his wife, Edna Abell of Greeley, had four children, and the family lived all over the world thanks to Warren's pursuits. After college, he worked as a foreign policy advisor for the International Cooperation Administration, a federal program that provided foreign aid and coordinated non-military

security programs. After following this job to Norway, Bolivia and the Philippines (among many other locales), he eventually started his own paper called "The Towering Task," which laid out extensive plans for foreign aid programs. President John F. Kennedy's brother-in-law, Sargent Shriver, came across Wiggins' paper and he had a brilliant idea: Kennedy had made several campaign promises of providing foreign aid and creating a more dynamic foreign policy, and Wiggins' groundwork could help fulfill those promises. Kennedy agreed with Shriver, and Wiggins' paper became a formative document that would lead to the creation of the Peace Corp in 1961.

On August 9, 1962, Warren Wiggins was invited by President Kennedy to the White House to give a brief speech to a group of 600 Peace Corp trainees on the south lawn. President Kennedy was then given the floor to help explain his vision for the future of the Peace Corps, a program that Wiggins was instrumental in building.

Warren Wiggins served as the deputy director of the Peace Corps until 1967. He then created his own private firm, TransCentury, which ran a job center in Anacostia and a remedial education program in New York. Wiggins dedicated his professional and personal life to helping others, and the City of Evans is lucky to claim ties to him.

"He was ever inventive. He was putting his mind to problems," said former U.S. Senator Harris Wofford in a 2007 interview with the *Washington Post*. "Warren was not somebody to rest content with falling short. He was ever ready for the quantum leap."

REMARKS OF THE PRESIDENT
TO GROUP OF 600 PEACE CORPS
TRAINEES ON THE SOUTH LAWN
OF THE WHITE HOUSE

MR. WIGGINS: Peace Corps trainees, my name is Warren Wiggins. I am Sargent Shriver's Associate Director for Program Development and Operations and Acting Director. In his absence, it is my pleasure, as Acting Director of the Peace Corps, to say just a brief word of welcome to you and to extend Sargent's own personal disappointment in not being here with you today to share this particular occasion.

As you may have heard or know, Sarg is presently enroute to the Far East to visit the trainees of the foreign -- to visit the volunteers of the four Far Eastern countries, so it is just physically impossible for him to be here today.

We expect the President very shortly. I believe most of the volunteers are here, so there is nothing to do but just wait a couple of minutes until the President arrives.

PRESIDENT KENNEDY: Thank you very much.

Ladies and gentlemen, we are very glad to welcome you here to the White House.

This occasion gives me a particular sense of satisfaction to welcome 600 Americans from all parts of the country who have committed themselves to a great adventure, I think, for our country and more than our country, for really all people.

I think that by the end of this year we will have more than 5,000 Peace Corpsmen, men and women of all ages which most Americans knew little ten years ago, countries which we did not even know existed 20 years ago.

This is an extraordinary action by this country and I know that you are proud to take part in it. I must say that it gives me the greatest satisfaction that it is taking place at this time.

I have been through the list of the various areas to which you are going -- Georgetown University, 307 secondary school teachers for Ethiopia. Perhaps those of you going to doctors for Ethiopia who were included in that group. There are 11 teachers, nurses, auto mechanics, going to Afghanistan. They have gone to Afghanistan.

From George Washington University, 76 secondary and college teachers, agricultural extension workers, for Nepal. Would they raise their hands? Very good.

University of Maryland, 48 secondary school teachers and agricultural workers for Turkey, and 36 teachers at all levels for British Honduras. You got them sort of down at that end.

Nineteen secondary school teachers for Ecuador. Twelve secondary school teachers for Venezuela, and at Howard University, 29 rural development workers for Cyprus.

Is that better than going to British Honduras? I don't think it is.

Twenty-two English teachers for Togo. Twenty medical doctors, nurses and technicians for Togo. Nine fishermen for Togo. Seven English teachers for Niger. Six English teachers for Senegal. Nine medical doctors, nurses, technicians for Sierra Leone. Six hundred thirteen.

Well -- I must say I wish that all Americans could hear that litany of countries you are going to, your willingness to do it, and I hope that when you come back that we can persuade you to come and serve in the United States Government in other areas, particularly in the Foreign Service, in all of the areas, because I think the United States is so heavily involved in so many parts of the world, we are so in need of dedicated men and women of talent and experience, that I can think of no better recruiting ground than the Peace Corps for our future Foreign Service Officers, for those who represent our information services and aid agencies abroad, so that I hope that you will regard this as the first instalment in a long life of service in the most exciting career in the most exciting time, and that is serving this country in the 60's and 70's, so we are very proud to have you here.

The White House belongs to all the people, but I think it particularly belongs to you.

2020 Census will be crucial for Evans and Weld County

Census 2020 EVANS We Count. We Matter.

Why It Matters

Hospitals. Fire departments. Schools. Even roads and highways. The census can shape many different aspects of your community. Each year, the results help determine how more than \$675 billion in federal funding is distributed to states and communities. It's also mandated by the Constitution: The U.S. has counted its population every 10 years since 1790.

What to Expect in 2020

By April 2020, households will receive an invitation to participate in the census. You'll then have three options to respond: online, by phone, or by mail. We'll mark Census Day on April 1, 2020, with events across the country. This is a key date for the 2020 count: When completing the census, you'll note where you are living on April 1.

Am I Required to Respond to the Census?

Yes, all people living in the United States, Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands are required by law to be counted in the 2020 Census.

Why It's Required

Getting a complete and accurate census count is critically important. That's why your response is required by law. If you do not respond, the U.S. Census Bureau will follow up in person to collect the information.

Why is the census so important? The results are used to determine how many seats your state gets in Congress. State and local officials also use census counts to draw boundaries for congressional districts, state legislative districts, and school districts.

And just as you are required by law to participate, the Census Bureau is bound by law to protect your answers. Your responses are used only to produce statistics. The Census Bureau does not disclose any personal information.

Starting in 2019, you may begin to notice census takers in your neighborhood. This is a normal part of the 2020 Census preparation and data collection process. Census field representatives will also continue to collect information for the American Community Survey (ACS) and other ongoing surveys.

Why Does the Census Bureau Do This?

You might see census takers in your neighborhood for a few different reasons:

- They are verifying addresses in preparation for the census.
- They are collecting responses to the census or another survey.
- They are dropping off census materials.
- They are conducting quality checks on the census.



Census takers who verify addresses are called address canvassers. They help ensure an accurate and complete count by verifying address lists across a wide area of physical geography, housing structures, and residence types. Part of this effort involves census takers on the ground noting where houses, apartments, shelters, and other residences are located.

Census takers will begin visiting homes in 2020 to collect responses from those who did not respond online, by phone, or by mail. At the same time, there will be other surveys ongoing, such as the American Community Survey, so there will also be census field representatives visiting homes for other reasons as well.

How Can I Verify the Identity of a Census Worker?

If you are visited by someone from the U.S. Census Bureau, here are some tips to assure the validity of the field representative:

- Census takers must present an ID badge that includes a photograph of the field representative, a Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date.
- Note that census workers may be carrying a Census Bureau phone or a laptop as well as a bag with a Census Bureau logo.
- If you still have questions, call 800-923-8282 to speak with a local Census Bureau representative.

How Can I Avoid Being Visited at Home by Census Workers?

The best way to avoid being visited at home is to fill out your 2020 Census online, by phone, or by mail. Households will receive an invitation to begin participating in the census by April 1, 2020.

This is the first time ever that you'll be able to respond to the census online!
